- **Who is organising the conference?**

The Federal Foreign Office and the Indonesian Ministry of Foreign Affairs will co-host the Bali Democracy Forum – Berlin Chapter, which is co-sponsored by the Friedrich-Ebert-Stiftung. The Bali Democracy Forum, an open and inclusive annual intergovernmental ministerial-level forum, was founded by the Indonesian Government in 2008 and aims to expand and consolidate democracy in the Asia-Pacific region. With the increasing interest in the Bali Democracy Forum, including from countries outside the region, the Forum felt compelled to extend its activities. Following the “Bali Democracy Forum – Tunis Chapter” of 2017, the “Bali Democracy Forum – Berlin Chapter” is the second event in the series.

- **Why debate “Democracy and Migration”?**

The UN estimates that 258 million people worldwide live in places other than their country of birth, an increase of nearly 50% since 2000. Roughly two out of three international migrants are migrant workers. Are democracies up to the task of absorbing these migratory flows? Do the pressures resulting from irregular migration affect their ability to defend a rules-based global order? Will the drive for globalisation, despite its promise of fewer barriers to the movement of people and ideas, lose support?

- **Why are Germany and Indonesia co-hosting the event?**

Both Germany and Indonesia will join the UN Security Council as non-permanent members for a two-year period starting in 2019. The UN General Assembly will convene an intergovernmental summit in Marrakesh in December 2018 with a view to adopting the Global Compact for Safe, Orderly and Regular Migration. The Bali Democracy Forum – Berlin Chapter is intended to reach out and confirm Germany’s and Indonesia’s commitment to close cooperation, including through the promotion of democracy, global partnership, multilateralism and the strengthening of a rules-based world order.
